Students will practically study the conventions of Greek Theatre. They will be introduced to its origins and key features of the style.

<u>Greek Theatre</u>	<u>Assessment:</u>	
Students will learn about history and conventions of Greek Theatre and how to use them in a performance. They will find out about the nature of comedy and tragedy in Greek myths and legends, followed by creating a contemporary interpretation of Greek Theatre using key feature of the style.	Students will produce a devised performance that includes the conventions of Greek Theatre.	
	Assessment at KS3 will feature teacher feedback against unit specific success criteria, supplemented by peer and self-assessment. These assessments, in line with the school's assessment policy, will track the students' progress towards what they need to know by the end of Year 7.	
	Each student will regularly use their Words Matter blue notebooks to consolidate understanding of key and new Drama vocabulary to develop mastery of the subject. Termly spellings to develop subject specific literacy.
