Prior Learning (Topic) Diverse Voices and Dracula		
<u>War Poetry</u> Students will cover a range of poems based on conflict across different periods. The poets studied include: Jessie Pope, Wilfred Owen and Carol Ann Duffy		
<u>Gothic Literature</u> Students will study a range of Gothic Literature including 'The Tell Tale Heart', extracts from 'Frankenstein' and 'The Woman in Black'

<u>War Poetry</u> Historical context to a variety of different conflicts will be covered with a focus on encouraging empathy for understanding. Students will look at the role of propaganda in WW1 and WW2 and how poets/literary figures endeavoured to challenge this. Students will be taught how to analyse pieces of poetry and write effective analytical responses.	<p><i>Each term will involve at least one extended piece of writing and a minimum of 3 other formative assessments. These may include quizzing, exit tickets, whole class feedback and live marking.</i></p> <p>Composite Assessment 1: Students will complete a comparative response discussing two of the poems covered throughout this half-term. (R)</p>	
<u>Gothic</u> Students will study a 'The Tell Tale Heart' by Edgar Allen as well as extracts from 'Frankenstein' and 'The Woman in Black'. They will revisit and consolidate understanding of gothic conventions. Consider and analyse how a writer uses structure and language to create a gothic text. Apply these techniques to their own writing.	<p><i>Each term will involve at least one extended piece of writing and a minimum of 3 other formative assessments.
