The UK has a range of diverse landscapes. The coast is shaped by a number of physical processes. Distinctive coastal landforms are the result of rock type, structure and physical processes. Different management strategies can be used to protect coastlines from the effects of physical processes. The shape of river valleys changes as rivers flow downstream. Distinctive fluvial landforms result from different physical processes. Different management strategies can be used to protect river landscapes from the effects of flooding.	Mock exams testing knowledge of keywords, processes and concepts and your ability to apply these to unfamiliar situations/resources. Recorded on student tracker. Half-termly keyword tests to check understanding of keyword vocabulary. Recorded on student tracker. Skills: Fieldwork skills (planning, risk assessment, data collection, data presentation, analysis and conclusion) and issue evaluation. OS map skills and photographs. Mean, mode, median of data sets. Interpret line graphs of % change / calculate % Atlas maps: use and understand coordinates – latitude and longitude. Recognise and describe distributions and patterns of both human and physical features. Maps based on global and other scales may be used and students may be asked to identify and describe significant features of the physical and human landscape on them. Interpret maps of distribution, population movements, transport networks, settlement layout, relief and drainage. Analyse the inter-relationship between physical and human factors on maps and establish associations between observed patterns on thematic maps.
