Headteacher Editorial: The new academic year is off to an excellent start and I would like to commend our new Year 7 students, sixth formers, and recently appointed staff for the positive impact they've already made. As is customary at this time of year, the Department for Education has released the latest GCSE results and Heber's performance compares favourably both locally and nationally, once again setting a strong benchmark for the year ahead.



**Jeans for Genes Day** is our annual fundraising event to support gene therapy & research in the UK. This year it took place on Friday, 19<sup>th</sup> September to align with their national awareness week. Staff and students

were encouraged to wear **jeans** and make a donation. Together we raised almost £900 – thank you!

Another longstanding tradition at Heber is the annual **Harvest Assembly** that took place on Thursday, 2<sup>nd</sup> October. For over two decades we have had a close association with Chester Aid for the Homeless (CATH). Last year CATH was also one of the school's nominated 'Heber Charities' and we were able to support further by raising £850 to support their work in and around Chester.





This year did not fail to disappoint... once again it was great to see the decorated Harvest Boxes donated in the assembly. Rob Whittall, CATH CEO, took all this produce to their HQ to distribute through their foodbanks. In fact, the sheer volume of donations this year allowed CATH to support other food banks in the locality.

The annual **Governors' Day** in school started almost 20 years ago and was held again on Thursday, 9<sup>th</sup> October this year. Every Governor was in attendance and collectively they visited 35 lessons as well as eight PSHCE classes, two assemblies, four Year Council meetings and five staff focus groups – and that was just in the morning. In the afternoon, attention turned to shaping the strategic direction for 2025–2026. Heber remains steadfast in its commitment to excellence, setting the highest expectations for itself and the community. The school's unwavering ambition ensures that every student is empowered to thrive both academically and personally so they can truly be the best version of themselves, in and beyond the classroom.

Our Upper Sixth students are once again demonstrating their high aspirations by preparing applications for competitive university courses and institutions. Last year, an amazing 48% of our university applicants secured places at highly respected 'Russell Group' universities, and we also have an excellent record of students being accepted to Cambridge and Oxford (Oxbridge).

Twelve students have already submitted 'early entry' applications for courses including Dentistry (Kathryn Gray), Medicine (Jemima Aka, Rhys Evans & Abigail Segamwenge) and Veterinary Science (Phoebe Blake, Molly Brereton & Jayne Jones). We have five students applying to Oxbridge:



Laura Berisa (Experimental Psychology), Leo Dixon (Mathematics), Maisie Jeffery (Veterinary Science), Emily Russell (Natural Sciences), and Barney Smith (History).

Many other Upper Sixth students are now working hard to finalise their UCAS applications with an internal deadline to submit these by Friday, 19th December. Meanwhile, this year's members of our 'Employment Readiness Programme' are looking forward to their upcoming external sessions on CV and interview preparations, with the whole of the year group receiving mock interview practice in mid-November. We wish all our students the very best of luck with their post-18 applications.

Our annual school production is fast approaching! This year we are proud to present *Grease - School Edition*. We are, of course, familiar with the 1978 film starring John Travolta and Olivia Newton John and we are pleased to have secured all the great songs



written specifically for this film including *You're the One That I Want, Sandy, Hopelessly Devoted to You* and the memorable title song as well as the classic originals such as *Summer Nights* and *Greased Lightnin'*. This prize was awarded based on her brilliant work throughout the week, including strong recommendations from her tutors.

"It gives me great pleasure to present this week's Exhibitioner Award for Science to this student, whose work throughout the programme has been nothing short of outstanding. Emily has demonstrated a remarkable ability to engage with complex scientific ideas, showing a deep and nuanced understanding of computational, physical, and climate concepts. From the very beginning, she asked thoughtful and perceptive questions that pushed both her own understanding and the discussions in our sessions further. Her essay, exploring Antarctica's contribution to sea level rise, stood out as a piece of undergraduate-level writing. It combined rigorous scientific thinking with confident engagement in wider reading, and it was written with real clarity and purpose. The depth of analysis and intellectual maturity in her work is something rarely seen at this stage. Emily is an exceptionally bright and motivated student. Her decision to pursue Natural Sciences at university is a brilliant one. and there's no doubt that she will continue to thrive in this field. 

### Free School Meals

Did you know that by registering for Free School Meals your child not only has the opportunity to enjoy a free school meal? They may be entitled to some financial support for curriculum related day trips and visits.

The school also benefits from additional funding for children who are registered for free school meals or who have been registered in the past six years. The funding gives every student in the schooling system the same opportunities to succeed. Additional support mechanisms at Bishop Heber include intervention classes along with financial support for educational visits and activities.

## Am I eligible for Free School Meals?

You will qualify if you are receiving one of the following benefits:

- Income Support
- Income Based Jobseekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- Child Tax Credit but not Working Tax Credit and have an annual income that does not exceed £16,190.
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit.
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get).

## Do you receive Working Tax credit?

If you or a partner receives Working Tax Credit regardless of income, you will not qualify for free school meals.
